WASHINGTON, D.C. — Americans for the Arts will present the annual National Arts Awards on Tuesday, October 11, as part of National Arts and Humanities Month. The awards recognize those artists and arts supporters who exhibit exemplary national leadership and whose work demonstrates extraordinary artistic achievement. They are organizations and individuals—artists, business leaders, patrons, and educators—who understand that the arts enrich people and communities alike.

The awards will be presented at a gala dinner in New York City, chaired by Maria Bell. The cochairs for the event are Justine and Jeff Koons and Liane and Richard Weintraub.
