Adam J. Natale is the director of member services for Fractured Atlas in New York City. Since joining the staff, he has spearheaded a pilot program, known as the DC Area Artists Health Insurance Awareness Campaign, which seeks to improve low-cost healthcare for artists from that region. He recently created a revolutionary audience development initiative and established an ongoing relationship with New York University to offer workshops for students and alumni.
